**Case management** — Monitoring and supporting clients as they progress through their Client Investment (or Employment/Training) Plans. For learners, case management begins when a Client Investment (Employment/Training) Plan has been prepared and agreed to between the learner and the assessor. It ends 180 days after successful completion of training or on dissolution of the learner/training provider relationship.

There are two types of case management:

- 1. Financial Case Management, which involves activities to determine the client's continuing eligibility for ongoing or subsequent income support.
- 2. Career: Work/Life Case Management, which involves supporting individuals during implementation and progression through their Client Investment (Employment/Training) Plan.

**Common Service Delivery** — Ministry area responsible for the delivery of centralized services, including:

- Joint processing of funding applications with Alberta Learning
- Student Funding Contact Centre
- Career Information Hotline
- Income Support Contact Centre

**Client** — A person or organization accessing Human Services programs and services.

**Client Investment Plan** — A Client Investment Plan (or Employment/Training Plan) describes and records the mutual agreement between Alberta Human Resources and a learner about the specific steps the learner will take to attain their identified employment goal.

**Cohabiting partner** — "Cohabiting partners" are two adults in a relationship of interdependence where they: share one another's lives, are emotionally committed to one another, and function as an economic and domestic unit.

This includes relationships where:

- Two adults live together and have a child by birth or adoption
- Two adults live together and have entered into an adult interdependent partner agreement
- Two adults living together in a committed relationship including relationships formerly described as common-law
- Two adults are cohabiting partners but do not reside together (e.g., one partner is working out of town)

**Employability** — Level of skill, education or job preparedness of the individual

**Employability assessment** — To determine if an individual is labour market destined, and if so, determine whether training is required in order for the individual to enter and remain in the labour market. An employability assessment includes:

- Reviewing the client's occupational goal, as presented
- Reviewing the client's employment and training history
- Identifying the client's academic knowledge, skills and needs
- Identifying the client's occupational skills, strengths and barriers
- Identifying personal management factors in a client's life that may impact a client's career, work or life goals

**Employability skills** — A broad concept based on material published by the Conference Board of Canada and adopted by Alberta Human Services. Employability Skills are attitudes and behaviors a client needs to enter, stay in and progress in the workplace. Employability skills may include communication, managing information, using numbers, problem solving, demonstrating positive attitudes and behaviors, being responsible, work safety, working with others, and Canadian work culture.

**Employed** — Following completion of an Approved Program of Studies, a learner:

- Has continuous full-time employment consisting of an average of at least 30 hours per week, including self employment; or in the case of AISH clients, 15 to 29 hours per week; or
- Has continuous part-time employment of at least 20 hours per week; and
- Is receiving at least the minimum wage as defined in the Alberta Employment Standards Code

Informed choice is exercised when clients demonstrate they have researched, obtained, and considered information to establish a realistic employment goal, and are informed of the training and support options available to them to assist them in achieving their employment goal. Clients must be able to describe why training is needed and how they are ready, willing and able to pursue and benefit from full-time training, as agreed to by the client and client assessor, to reach their defined employment goal.

**Investment Plan** — Collaborative agreement between an individual client and an assessor that is the result of an assessment, which consists of the client's employment goal, the mutual agreement between Human Services and the client about the specific steps the client will take to attain their identified employment goal, the program and services required by the client and supported by Human Services, and agreed upon activities and outcomes, including the specific steps necessary towards the attainment of the client's goals.

 ${f JOBS}$  — Job Order Bank Service — a free job bank service for Alberta employers and job seekers provided under the Canada — Alberta Labour Market Development Agreement.

**Job placement services** — Services that match eligible Albertans seeking work directly with prospective employers able to provide them with viable employment.
