

Ministerial Order No. 2018-19

WHEREAS certain payments and exemptions may be established by the Minister for the purposes of providing income support benefits under the *Income and Employment Supports Act* (the *Act*) and the Income Support, Training and Health Benefits Regulation (the Regulation);

AND WHEREAS An Act to Combat Poverty and Fight for Albertans with Disabilities provides for the annual adjustment of income support payment amounts by the Alberta Consumer Price Index (CPI) in accordance with the Act and Regulations;

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to re-establish the payments and exemptions previously set out in Ministerial Order No. 2016-22 of the former department of Human Services for the purposes of calculating amounts for the 2019 CPI adjustment year;

I, IRFAN SABIR, Minister of Community and Social Services, effective January 1, 2019:

- 1 Pursuant to section 6(a) of the Schedule of the Act, establish the core essential payment rates set out in the attached Appendix A;
- 2 Pursuant to Schedule 1 of the Regulation, establish the exempt assets set out in the attached Appendix B;
- 3 Pursuant to Schedule 2 of the Regulation, establish the exempt financial resources set out in the attached Appendix C;
- 4 Pursuant to section 10 of the Schedule of the *Act*, establish the amounts or values of supplementary income support payments or allowances and the frequencies with which the payments or allowances may be provided for the purposes of Schedule 4 of the Regulation, as set out in the attached Appendix D; and
- 5 Rescind Ministerial Order No. 2016-22 of the former department of Human Services.
