

For over a decade, Sister Mary Jeanne has been working to offer spiritual service and support to those in crisis. She found her calling in working with rural, remote Aboriginal communities in the Peace River area. As an Elder with the Northwest Alberta Child and Family Services Authority (CFSA), she works with vulnerable children, youth, families and caregivers. As a member of the Peace River Aboriginal Interagency Committee, she advocates for those she serves and has been instrumental in organizing the Sisters in Spirit Walk in recognition of the missing and murdered Aboriginal women across this country. Sister Mary Jeanne believes that relationships can be healed and justice restored among nations by coming together and sharing from our hearts, always depending on Jesus - for "Love cannot wait."

For 30 years, the CDVC has been a beacon of hope in the Calgary area, working to provide seamless service delivery and supports for those affected by family violence. As a large collective with representation from multiple systems and over 50 organizations, they have demonstrated the power of collaboration with numerous achievements. The CDVC has been instrumental in many key initiatives, including creating a men's domestic conflict helpline in 1996, supporting the establishment of HomeFront in 1998 and executing the Domestic Violence Protocol Project. The Protocol Project resulted in better working relationships between various medical facilities and non-profit agencies, created greater efficiencies for service providers and, most importantly, provided those in need of support, with a better quality of care.





What do "The Cop, the Holy Roller and the Dragon Lady" have to do with family violence? They are just a few of the many dedicated community members who came together to take action following a triple murder-suicide of a young family in Drayton Valley. What started as a few volunteer drivers who could transport women and children leaving violent situations to safety has become a dynamic group of men and women in the community who have pooled their expertise and passion to form CFVI. They've developed a free program to teach participants to recognize abusive situations and behaviours and to make healthier decisions. The success of the program led to the creation of the Drayton Valley CFVI Group Facilitator Training Manual, which has become an important tool for other Alberta communities.

Marta has also served as the President of WINGS board since 2002, and she was a tenacious and driving force behind WINGS' successful capital campaign for a new 20-suite facility for women and children. Marta then applied these skills and championed a second capital campaign and the completion of the "Home Next Door" - a 30 unit affordable housing complex for women and children who wish to continue their healing journeys. Marta leads with passion, is a creative thinker, and is a rare and treasured gem who inspires all those around her.
