It will give 20 recent graduates from high school or post-secondary the opportunity to gain valuable government work experience.

You all have a wide range of skill sets and abilities to contribute to the workforce.

I have seen for myself that enabling people to be employed is one of the best ways to improve people's lives and be engaged in the community.

To build on the good work being done, we need to hear from you.

Sharing your thoughts and ideas makes a difference.

Your commitment to speaking out and engaging with others in your communities ensures that better outcomes are achieved.

I know the ideas that will come out of the summit will help us build a better, more inclusive Alberta.
