With a funding commitment of \$20 million, we will support projects and community plans that end violence and abuse, as well as some of the root causes that lead to discord in the home.

I look forward to seeing that program roll out in the coming months.

Because it means that we are continuing to move forward and add more supports and services that people can turn to in their time of need.

Again, thank you to the City of Edmonton for this proclamation and to all of you for being here.
