You've chosen to view that yellow tape as a critical transition point... between first responders and the first step towards recovery.

You're working behind the scenes and beyond the crisis to support individuals during the critical recovery process.

You're there to care for people and ensure their needs are met once flood waters have receded and fires have gone out.

You are making a conscious effort to not just meet the needs of your neighbours... but to put yourselves in their shoes to find ways to better meet their needs both during and after a crisis.

I'd like you to take a moment to give <u>vourselves</u> a round of applause for the great work you do...to ensure the members of your community will be cared for during crisis situations.

No matter where you are located in the province... you do great work in your local communities.

You are the unsung heroes who do this good work whenever you're needed... often without credit or recognition.

Your network is a shining example of how municipalities and other stakeholders can share ideas and best practices to ensure that next time... we'll be even better prepared.

Through your breakout sessions... you'll also be learning about some key partners who can support you.

I'm also here today to tell you that the Government of Alberta supports your efforts and recognizes the prompt and efficient delivery of emergency social services is a critical element of any crisis.

At the 2013 Disaster Forum... the Minister of Municipal Affairs announced the appointment of Human Services as the lead for the Provincial Emergency Social Services Framework.

As part of my mandate on behalf of Government... Human Services is committed to working collaboratively as we move the development of the framework forward.

With governments... communities... partners and stakeholders... with the ultimate goal of achieving better results for Albertans.

When a crisis or emergency occurs... we will work directly with those involved with the crisis... supporting municipalities as they implement local response plans and engage community resources.

From bringing families back together to managing volunteers to providing essential services... the Government of Alberta will be there for you.

We look to all of you as critical ambassadors who will reach across the yellow tape and help your friends and neighbours.

And by sharing your successes and best practices across the Network... you'll be helping all Albertans.
