

Supports for Families of Children and Youth with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD)

Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD)

The FSCD program helps families identify and access services and supports to strengthen families' ability to promote their child's healthy development and encourage their child's participation in activities at home and in the community. FSCD is not based on particular diagnoses but rather the impact the disability has on a child and family. Children might be diagnosed with something prior to an FASD diagnosis and that does not limit the support a family receives. FSCD looks at the child's daily functioning and not their disability when assessing for services.

FSCD staff work together with parents and their community partners, including their local FASD Service Network, to coordinate services to address the family's and child's needs. Along with providing information and referrals, FSCD provides funding for a wide range of supports and services based on each family's individual needs, which may include:

- Individual and Family Counselling;
- Respite services;
- Aide supports;
- Child care supports;
- Specialized services for families of children with severe disabilities;
- Out of home placements; and
- Assistance with some of the disability-related costs for:
 - o Attending medical appointments;
 - Clothing and footwear; and
 - Health-related needs such as dental care, medical supplies, ambulance and prescription drugs, formulas or diets.

Families are responsible for all of the costs typically associated with raising a child.
